ART 80 Course Fee Impact Statement

- 1. The fee will be assessed per student enrolled in ART 80. The materials purchased with the fee will be administered specifically and directly to students enrolled in the course.
- 2. For the animation program, there are currently only fees required for ART 37. That course engages in a substantial amount of printing and the fees are used to purchase ink and specialty paper stock that are only used for that course.

This is a new fee for ART 80, which has never had any fees. The program has acquired a 3D printer and the assignments will now include 3D printing. Students will also print digital scenes using a wide format inkjet printer. We had to suspend the inkjet printing assignments because there is no budget for supplies.

The course objectives are for students to learn 3D modeling in both a digital and physical form. Printing will require expendable materials. Below are the relevant SLOs for the course.

- Demonstrate a proficiency in creating 3D digital objects and spaces. (SLO1b)
- Demonstrate an understanding of lighting and surface physics through visual simulation in projects. (SLO 1b & 4)
- 3. The fees will affect undergraduate animation students, mostly juniors. The course enrolls 24 students in one section and is offered every Fall. The materials purchased will allow students to work with specialized materials for 3D printing and 2D printing. This allows them to actualize their works into physical media. It also provides them with multiple, additional career paths that utilize the skills they learn in our program.

A class fee of **\$40** per student will cover all necessary expendable items for the course. Items will be purchased through standard university processes of purchase orders directly to vendors. Based on enrollment, orders for items will be placed the second week of classes to ensure delivery by project dates. The prices listed below do not include sales tax.

ART 181 COURSE FEE IMPACT STATEMENT

- 1. The fee will be assessed by students enrolled in ART 181. The materials purchased with the fee will be administered specifically to students enrolled in the course.
- 2. For the animation program, there are only fees required for ART 37. That course engages in a substantial amount of printing and the fees are used to purchase ink and specialty paper stock that are only used for that course.

This is a new fee for ART 181, which has not had any fees since it was created. Students have been using materials the instructor has bought with personal funds and purchased materials with their own funds.

The course objectives are for students to learn 2D animation in both traditional and digital animation. The traditional process requires materials, some of which are not easy to obtain. Traditional processes provide not only a strong foundation for historical reference but are still used in contemporary animation today. Below are the relevant SLOs for the course.

- Demonstrate a proficiency in creating complete time-based projects using traditional and contemporary approaches. (SLO1b)
- Illustrate content ideas to a visual format via storyboards. (SLO 1b & 4)
- 3. The fees will affect undergraduate animation students, mostly juniors. There is one section per semester at 24 students. The materials purchased will allow students to work with specialized materials used in the animation industry. Most students are unaware of physical items used in the industry, and the fee will allow them to access and experience them for class projects. The fee will also allow students to create high-quality printouts for their projects.

A class fee of \$35 per student will cover all necessary expendable items for the course. Items will be purchased through standard university processes of procurement. Based on enrollment, orders for items will be placed the second week of classes to ensure delivery by project dates. The prices listed below do not include sales tax.

RE: Course Fee Increase Request: PLANT 40 - INTRODUCTION TO ORNAMENTAL HORTICULTURE

Request to increase the Introduction to Ornamental Horticulture course fee from \$10 to \$25 per student to cover rising costs of live plant materials, greenhouse media, pots, fertilizers, and landscape supplies used in labs and projects. This course is required for all Agricultural Education majors, enrolls students across all Jordan College majors, and serves as the sole introduction to California's \$10+ billion nursery, greenhouse, and landscape industry. The fee increase ensures students continue to benefit from high-impact, hands-on learning experiences that prepare them for teaching careers and professional roles in the horticultural industry.

Fee Assessment

- Applies to all students enrolled in Introduction to Ornamental Horticulture.
- Estimated enrollment: ~50 freshmen/sophomores annually.

2. Fee History

- Current fee: \$10 (unchanged for 5+ years).
- Proposed increase: \$25.

3. Student Impact & Benefits

• Hands-on training with live plants, greenhouse tools, soils, fertilizers, and landscape materials.

RE: Course Fee Increase Request: PLANT 107-PLANT PROPAGATION

Request to increase the **Plant Propagation course fee from \$10 to \$25 per student** to sustain and enhance high-impact, hands-on learning. Supply costs for greenhouse media, propagation trays, grafting tools, and tissue culture materials have risen significantly, and the current fee no longer covers essential consumables. This course directly prepares juniors and seniors for industry and graduate-level work through experiential labs, research, and community projects. The proposed increase ensures students continue to receive high-quality training with appropriate materials, maintaining course rigor and student success.

1. Fee Assessment

The proposed course fee will be assessed to all students enrolled in the Plant Propagation (upper-division) course within the Department of Plant Science. The fee will not apply to students outside of this course or program.

2. Five-Year History of Fees in Program

- Current fee: \$10 per student (unchanged for over five years).
- Proposed increase: \$25 per student.

Rationale for Increase:

Consumable costs for plant propagation (soil media, greenhouse trays, seeds, grafting supplies, tissue culture media) have risen significantly. The current \$10 fee no longer covers necessary materials for labs and projects. Increasing to \$25 ensures that students continue to receive quality, hands-on training in alignment with industry practices.

Course Objectives:

- Train students in propagation methods including seed, cutting, grafting, layering, and tissue culture.
- Provide experiential, project-based learning opportunities in greenhouse and lab settings.
- Prepare students for careers in horticulture, agriculture, and plant science industries.

3. Impact by Student Classification and Level

- Undergraduate students (primarily juniors and seniors): ~50 students annually.
- Graduate/Professional students: Not applicable.

5. Impact if Fee Is Not Approved

If the fee remains at \$10 per student:

- Students will face limited access to consumables, resulting in fewer lab experiences.
- Advanced techniques (grafting, tissue culture) may not be taught consistently due to material shortages.
- Service-learning and research opportunities will be curtailed, diminishing high-impact practices.

Alternative Means Explored:


- Departmental operating budgets are insufficient for recurring supply costs.
- Grants and donor contributions have been inconsistent and cannot reliably sustain annual consumable needs.
- The fee increase is the most equitable and sustainable solution.

Executive Summary

The Orientation Program fee has remained unchanged at \$70 for the past 12 years. During this time, the essential costs of staffing, facilities, technology, supplies, and program enhancements have increased substantially. Additionally, orientation attendance has increased since becoming a required program for all incoming students. To ensure the Orientation Program continues to deliver a high-quality experience for incoming students and their families, we propose a fee increase beginning in the 2026-2027 academic year.

This proposal outlines the rising costs, the rationale for the increase, and a five-year projection to ensure the program remains financially sustainable without requiring annual fee adjustments.

Current Situation

• Current Fee: \$70 (unchanged since 2013)

• Years Since Last Increase: 12 years

• Average U.S. inflation since last increase: ~2–3% annually

• Cumulative Inflation Impact: ~30–40% increase in costs since last adjustment

The program's costs have grown by over 121% while revenue has remained flat due to the stagnant \$70 fee. Unlike some of the CSU sister campuses, Fresno State does not have an enrollment deposit (16 CSUs), nor does Dog Days receive any state funding (7 CSUs) to help offset fees and staff salaries.

Proposed Fee Increase

Each of the proposed fee increases is within a reasonable range compared to peer institutions in the CSU. To ensure program sustainability for the next five years, we propose increasing the Dog Days Orientation Program fee to:

New Freshmen Fee (2026–2027): \$120

- This represents an increase of \$50 (from \$70), or ~71%.
- The CSU average freshman orientation cost is \$149; Fresno State would have the 11th lowest fee in the CSU.

New Transfer Fee (2026–2027): \$90

- This represents an increase of \$20 (from \$70), or ~29%.
- The CSU average transfer orientation cost is \$123; Fresno State would have the 8th lowest fee in the CSU.

New Supporter Fee (2026–2027): \$40

- This represents an increase of \$15 (from \$25), or **60%**.
- The CSU average supporter fee is \$57; not all CSUs allow supporters to attend orientation.

Benefits of Fee Increase

- Increase program quality by returning the Orientation Leader to student ratio to pre-pandemic levels of 1 to 15 versus current levels of 1 to 24.
- Cover rising costs of staffing, catering, facilities, and program materials.
- Reinstate more comprehensive student staff training.
- Invest in program improvements such as digital resources, pre-Dog Days programming, inclusive programming, and enhanced student support.
- Ensure financial stability for the next 5 years, reducing the need for frequent increases.

Recommendation

We recommend approval of the proposed fee increase from:

- \$70 to \$120 for freshmen beginning in the 2026–27 academic year,
- \$70 to \$90 for transfer students beginning in the 2026–27 academic year,
- \$25 to \$40 for supporters and families beginning in the 2026–27 academic year.

with a scheduled review every two years to align fees with actual cost increases.

This adjustment is necessary to sustain the Dog Days Orientation Program's quality and ensure that new students and families continue to have a welcoming, supportive, and well-resourced introduction to the university community.
