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Introduction/Overview

The Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989 and its implementing regulations (34 C.F.R. Part 86) requires that any institution of higher education that receives Federal financial assistance must adopt and implement a program to prevent the illicit use of drugs and alcohol abuse by students and employees on school premises or as part of any of its activities.

This Biennial Review of California State University, Fresno (hereafter referred to as Fresno State) covers from the Fall of 2023 through the Spring of 2025. The Biennial Review Reports are currently housed in the Student Health and Counseling Center. The current Biennial Review Report is available on the Student Health and Counseling Center's website. The Biennial Review process involved requesting, collecting and reviewing AOD policy, education and programs, enforcement, and assessment activities from campus stakeholders across all divisions of the University. Campus health assessment data was also collected and assessed.

Annual Policy Notification Process

Policies are distributed to students and employees each academic year via multiple channels:

- **Students:** All students, including those in continuing education, single-class enrollees, and online students, receive policy notifications through email, orientations, and online platforms. Policies are distributed at the start of each semester.
- **Employees:** Notifications are sent annually via email and available in the Human Resources.

Fresno State's [Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program \(DAAPP\)](#) consists of:

1. Policy Dissemination: Regular updates to all students, staff, and faculty about AOD-related policies.
2. Education: Information on health risks and consequences of substance abuse.
3. Support Services: Access to rehabilitation, re-entry programs, and other campus resources.
4. Enforcement: Strict adherence to AOD policies, including sanctions for violations.
5. Assessment: Ongoing evaluation of AOD incidents, trends, and program effectiveness.

AOD SWOT/C Analysis

- **Challenges:** Increased prevalence of synthetic opioids, and cannabis.

Goal Review Statement

Fresno State accomplished many of the AOD program goals by researching different positions in the CSU system, advocating for the AOD Health Educator position, and filling the position in the Fall of 2024. Since then, Fresno State has offered three recovery meetings a week for students to attend. There are updates to the AOD portion of the website that include information on many different categories of substances and answers to frequently asked questions about these substances. The Alcohol and Other Drug Advisory Committee has expanded to include attendance from all current campus and community partners that meet twice during each semester.

There were a number of legislative bills introduced during the 2023-25 period and the Student Health and Counseling Center took on the responsibility to comply by providing Narcan training to students and providing access to Drink

and Fentanyl Test Strips in the pharmacy and Wellness To Go Vending Machine.

Legislations

- **[SB 367](#): Student Safety: Opioid Overdose Reversal Medication**
 - Provide educational and preventive information about naloxone
 - Distribute naloxone through naloxone distribution project

- **[AB 461](#): Student Safety Fentanyl Test Strips**
 - To provide information about the use and location of fentanyl test strips as part of established campus orientations and to notify students of the presence and location of fentanyl test strips.
 - Require that each campus health center stock and distribute fentanyl test strips

- **[AB 1841](#): Student Safety: Opioid Overdose Reversal Medication in Student Housing**
 - To notify students of the location of narcan and fentanyl test strips
 - Provide residential advisors who work in a university or college affiliated student housing (housing and greek life)
 - *The bill would prohibit disciplinary measures from being imposed for any violation of the institution's student conduct policy regarding drug possession, use, or treatment that occurs at or near the time of an incident where a residential adviser or house manager administers a dose of a federally approved opioid overdose reversal medication, as provided.*

- **[AB 1996](#): Opioid Antagonists: Stadiums, concert venues, amusement parks**
 - Each stadium, concert venue, and amusement park shall, at all times, maintain unexpired doses of naloxone hydrochloride or any other opioid antagonist on its premises and ensure that at least two employees are aware of the location of the naloxone hydrochloride or other opioid antagonist.

Recommendations and Goals for Next Biennium

- Enhanced Support: Targeted interventions for vulnerable groups and expanded recovery services.

- Annual notification notice to newly hired faculty.
- Improve data collection from campus partners.
- Review and update Alcohol Policy
- Review and update the DAAPP

Conclusion

The 2023–2025 review demonstrates Fresno State’s sustained commitment to advancing alcohol and other drug (AOD) prevention, education, and recovery initiatives. Notable achievements include the successful establishment of the AOD Health Educator position, expansion of recovery support meetings for students, enhancement of online educational materials, and the revitalization of the Alcohol and Other Drug Advisory Committee with broad campus and community representation. The university also achieved compliance with newly enacted state legislation by implementing naloxone training, and ensuring the availability of fentanyl test strips and other harm reduction resources through the Student Health and Counseling Center.

Continued progress will depend on strengthening data collection processes, maintaining consistent policy review, and expanding targeted recovery and prevention services. Fresno State remains dedicated to fostering a safe, informed, and supportive campus environment through ongoing collaboration, evidence-based practices, and alignment with state and federal guidelines.

- eCHECKUP TO GO programs are personalized, evidence-based online interventions that are designed to motivate users to make positive changes and enhance overall well-being and mental health.
- Fresno State has been participating in the eCHECKUP TO GO alcohol program since 2013. The cannabis edition was added later.

About the most recent implementation:

- Conducted in Fall 2023 (first 4 weeks of class - Aug 16 thru Sep 21)
- Invited all incoming freshmen and transfer students to participate
- Participants: 1,124 cannabis module and 1,362 alcohol module
- Not mandatory but encouraged
- Paid out of Wellness Services at the Student Health and Counseling Center

- Most students keep their BAC as a less-harmful level (between median of 0.03% and avg. of 0.05%)
- Even during their "heaviest drinking episode," most students do not report drinking at dangerous levels (between median of 0.06% and avg. of 0.09%)
- Students spend an average of \$13 on alcohol per month
- The majority of students report AUDIT scores in the "low" level (0-7) with an average AUDIT score of 4.22. (The AUDIT is a measure of experiencing negative consequences from alcohol use and higher-risk scores have been associated with risk for future alcohol dependence.)

- Almost no students report driving after drinking 3 or more drinks (0.09 times per month, on average)
- Almost no students report driving with a friend who drank 3 or more drinks (0.21 times per month, on average)
- Almost no students report smoking cigarettes (avg. 0.16%)

- Cannabis users use it more frequently on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.
- The vast majority do not mix alcohol and cannabis (68%)
- Users spend an average of \$9/week on cannabis. However, the most frequent response was \$0/week, indicating either they are getting it from friends, or they purchase cannabis infrequently in larger amounts that last a longer time, (i.e., they don't buy every week).

- Students spend an average of \$13 on alcohol per month
- The majority of students report AUDIT scores in the "low" level (0-7) with an average AUDIT score of 3.44. (The AUDIT is a measure of experiencing negative consequences from alcohol use and higher-risk scores have been associated with risk for future alcohol dependence.)

- Almost no students report driving after drinking 3 or more drinks (0.02 times per month, on average)
- Almost no students report driving with a friend who drank 3 or more drinks (0.03 times per month, on average)
- Almost no students report smoking cigarettes (avg. 0.03%)

Among those drinking alcohol monthly:

- Most students who drink keep their BAC as a less-harmful level (between median of 0.00% and avg. of 0.04%)
- Even during their "heaviest drinking episode," most students who drink do not report drinking at dangerous levels (between median of 0.00% and avg. of 0.07%)
- Students who drink spend an average of \$10.50 on alcohol per month
- The majority of students who drink report AUDIT scores in the "low" level (0-7) with an average AUDIT score of 3.71. (The AUDIT is a measure of experiencing negative

consequences from alcohol use and higher-risk scores have been associated with risk for future alcohol dependence.)

- Almost no students report driving after drinking 3 or more drinks (0.01 times per month, on average)
- Almost no students report driving with a friend who drank 3 or more drinks (0.05 times per month, on average)
- Almost no students report smoking cigarettes (avg. 0.04%)

N=930

Lifetime Users: 215

Abstainers: 715

Percent ever used: 23.1%

Among those who have ever used cannabis:

- The average age of first use was 17 years and the median age of first use was 15, suggesting that most students first used cannabis prior to arriving at college.
- The frequency of use was bi-modal: Most lifetime users do not use cannabis regularly (more than 50% report using cannabis less than monthly), but of those who do use at least once a month, around 21% use cannabis every week.
- Cannabis users use it more frequently on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.
- The majority of cannabis users do not mix alcohol and cannabis (66%)
- Users spend an average of \$11/week on cannabis. However, the most frequent response was \$0/week, indicating either they are getting it from friends, or they purchase cannabis infrequently in larger amounts that last a longer time, (i.e., they don't buy every week).

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- Fresno State has been participating in the eCHECKUP TO GO alcohol program since 2013. The cannabis edition was added later.

About the most recent implementation:

- Conducted in Spring 2025 (first 3 weeks of class - Jan 16 thru Feb 6)
- Invited all incoming 873 transfer students to participate
- Participants: 168 alcohol module and 119 cannabis module
- Not mandatory but encouraged
- Paid out of Wellness Services at the Student Health and Counseling Center

Key Data Points about Alcohol Module Findings:

N=168 (*N=182 in Spring '24*)

Monthly Users: 59 (*61 in Spring '24*)

Monthly non-users: 109 (*121 in Spring '24*)

Percent using Monthly: 35.1% (*33.5% in Spring '24*)

Among those drinking alcohol monthly:

- Most students do not drink regularly (less than 1 week a month; avg. 0.79 wks/month)
- Among students who drink, most drink between 10-11 drinks in a typical month (10.7 avg)
- Most students who drink keep their BAC as a less-harmful level (between median of 0.00% and avg. of 0.04%)
- During their "heaviest drinking episode," most students who drink do not report drinking at dangerous levels (median of 0.00%) but some who drink more than average pull the average "heaviest drinking episode" BAC up (0.07%), including 6 students who reported estimated BACs > 0.16%.
- Students who drink spend an average of \$6.67 on alcohol per month
- The majority of students who drink report AUDIT scores in the "low" level (0-7) with an average AUDIT score of 1.73. (The AUDIT is a measure of experiencing negative

consequences from alcohol use and higher-risk scores have been associated with risk for future alcohol dependence.)

- Almost no students report driving after drinking 3 or more drinks (0.02 times per month, on average)
- Almost no students report driving with a friend who drank 3 or more drinks (0.03 times per month, on average)
- Almost no students report smoking cigarettes (avg. 0.00%)

Key Data Points about Cannabis Module Findings:

N=119 (*N=151 in Spring '24*)

Lifetime Users: 39 (*63 in Spring '24*)

Abstainers: 80 (*88 in Spring '24*)

Percent ever used: 32.8% (*71% in Spring '24**)

*Given the smaller dataset for both instruments, and high proportion of users in the Cannabis program, the numbers are *not* generalizable to the general student population and should be interpreted with caution.

Among those who have ever used cannabis:

- The average age of first use was 17 years, suggesting that most students first used cannabis prior to arriving at college. However, 12 students (30% of users) reported first using cannabis at the age of 21.
- The frequency of use was bi-modal: Most lifetime users do not use cannabis regularly (more than 50% report using cannabis less than monthly), but of those who do use at least once a month, around 42% use cannabis every week.
- Cannabis users use it more frequently on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.
- The majority of cannabis users do not mix alcohol and cannabis (80%)
- Users spend an average of \$7/week on cannabis. However, the most frequent response was \$0/week, indicating either they are getting it from friends, or they purchase cannabis infrequently in larger amounts that last a longer time, (i.e., they don't buy every week).
