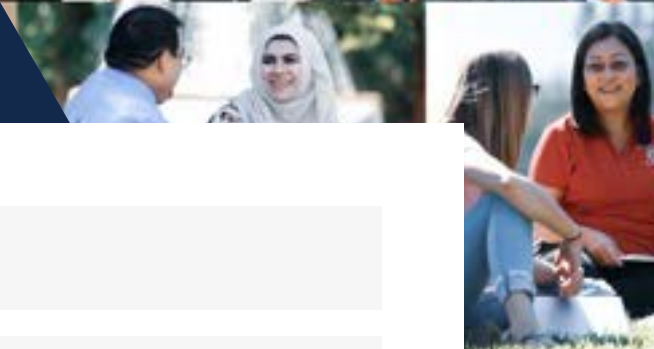

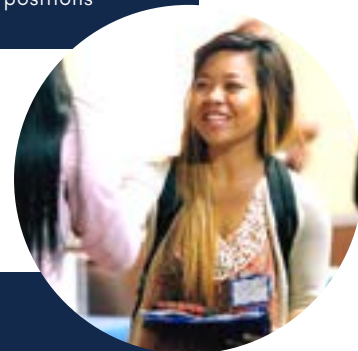

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

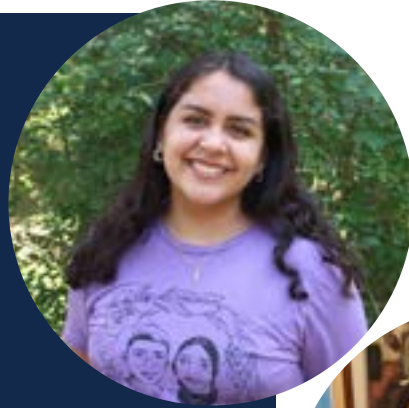
The Career Development Center was one of just a few throughout the entire CSU system to host in-person career fairs for the first time since the pandemic. In the fall, three fairs were hosted with 795 students in attendance. In the spring, the Career Development Center hosted three events and assisted with two in the Criminology and Social Work Departments. Over the course of the five events that semester, 1,110 students participated and over 380 employers were in attendance. Both employers and students were excited to connect in-person.

MAJOR MILESTONES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

CAMP completed its 37th year of funding at Fresno State.

The program served 50 first-time freshmen students in 2021-2022.

CAMP programs across the nation annually visit Fresno State CAMP to learn its best practices. This year, we hosted a total of 8 CAMP programs from 6 different states.



DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Two freshman CAMP students were selected to participate in recognized internships in different parts of the United States for the summer.

Citlaly Marquez (English Education major, pictured top left) is in South Carolina participating in the Into the Fields Internship through Student Action with Farmworkers (SAF). SAF is a non-profit organization that focuses on the active collaboration between students and farm workers to share resources and promote social change and justice in farm work labor. Ms. Marquez is primarily working with the Migrant Education Program to connect with farm workers, teaching them English during their time off. Additionally, Citlaly helps provide transportation, translation services, and food/supply distribution to farm workers around the state of South Carolina.

Nadia Rojas (Community Health Science major, pictured bottom right) is one of six of the National HEP/CAMP Association interns completing her internship in Washington, D.C. She is the summer intern for Congressman Raúl Grijalva from Arizona's 3rd congressional district. Prior to the start of the internship, Nadia trained with the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute (CHCI) to gain the skills necessary to fully succeed in her placement. As an intern for Congressman Grijalva, Nadia writes co-sponsor reports, answers phone calls from constituents or other individuals from the House of Representatives, attends meetings with staffers, creates news clips, assists staffers with ongoing projects, and supports with other duties as needed in the office.

The Dream Success Center is committed to empowering students through a welcoming and supportive environment ensuring access and success through advocacy and outreach.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Citlalli Rendon Guzman graduated Summa Cum Laude this spring, with a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology. During DREAM Week at Fresno State, Citlalli showcased her research efforts along with Fresno State associate professor, Dr. Luis Fernando Macias. Her research, "Only given half of the instructions: Undocumented Students Navigating a Higher Education in CA's Central Valley," focuses on highlighting the struggles undocumented students navigate as they pursue higher education. Through this research experience, Citlalli realized how limited the research of undocumented students in the Central Valley really is. She hopes to contribute to it and open the doors for others.

The Educational Opportunity Program provides access and support services to first-generation and economically disadvantaged students who demonstrate the potential to succeed at Fresno State.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Héctor Jácome-Sáenz (4.0 GPA, BS Plant Science) is now a lab assistant at Kearney Ag Research and Extension Center, and hopes to become a professor. Tania Sanchez (4.0 GPA, MS School Counseling) works in education and plans to return to Fresno State for a Doctorate in Educational Leadership.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

During spring 2022, tutoring and front desk staff collaborated to improve student usage and retention. Tutoring Coordinator Tony Losongco identified students who used tutoring one week but did not use it the following week. Administrative Support Assistant Monica Cervantes led the front desk team through phone outreach. Out of 1,004 students reached, 1 in 4 (23%) used tutoring the week they were called. Additional resources and referrals were provided to students as part of the outreach effort.

The Office of Black Student Success (OBSS) is committed to provide supportive services that foster the transition and integration of Black students into the university and help them to thrive and achieve academic and personal success.

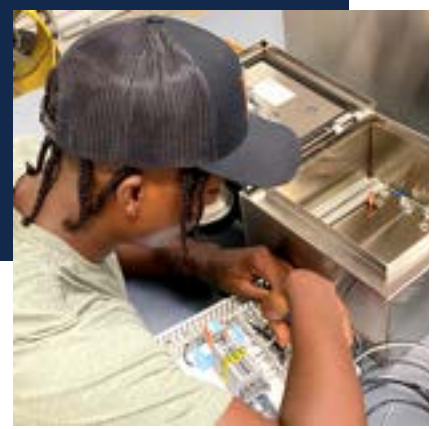

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Christopher Kyles, an OBSS student, graduated with a degree in Industrial Technology. Originally from Los Banos, he led the Fresno State Robotics Club while also setting himself up for a career in robotic engineering—landing internships with Grundfos Pumps and Dynamic Controls. Kyles is a recipient of the Manuel and Eugenie Ortiz Memorial Scholarship, and plans to work as an engineer in manufacturing, robotics and automation.

Renaissance Scholars Program (RSP) is dedicated to serving students at Fresno State who have experienced foster care or an unaccompanied youth by providing a supportive environment that fosters student success.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

The George and Melodie Rogers Foundation Renaissance Scholars Summer Internship Program Endowment was established with a \$1 million gift. Students participating in the program will receive a \$2,400 stipend for hours dedicated to their summer internships.

Both TRIO Student Support Services Program (SSSP) and Student Support Services Veterans (SSSV) provide academic support, financial aid literacy/education, and graduate school preparation support to ensure every individual's successful retention and graduation.

SSSP and SSSV are federally funded TRIO grant programs (under the US Department of Education) that serve first-generation students, students from low-income backgrounds, and students with disabilities.

SSSV Women Veteran Connection: An annual community-building event for Fresno State female veteran students, faculty and staff to share veteran resources and connect at Fresno State. This year's event had 21 participants, all of whom participated in a free painting lesson offered by local artist Colleen Wilson. Representatives from the Veteran Affairs Hospital offered women health resources, and local partners donated goodie bags with information resources on financial need and family care, as well as lunch boxes for our women veterans.



DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Rebekah Moses was the 2022 Undergraduate Dean's Medalist, earning her BS in health science with a 4.0 GPA. She enlisted in the military at the age of 17, serving eight years as a hospital corpsman and earning several awards. She will attend National University to pursue her Master's in public health with a focus in health administration.

Jocelyn Ramirez was nominated for the 2022 Undergraduate Dean's Medal. She has been accepted into the Student Affairs and College Counseling graduate program at Fresno State. She said, "Experiencing firsthand the positive effects of the TRIO Program, I decided I would like to be part of a supportive community for many other students."

The mission of the University Advising Center is to empower undergraduate students by helping them take responsibility for achieving their academic and personal goals, with a particular focus on the undeclared /undecided student, and to support the university advising community.

Dog Days: New Student Orientation resumed smaller scale in-person events in January 2022. Both smaller in-person and virtual orientation were planned for summer 2022.



DEPARTMENT IMPACT

I met with MM (name withheld for privacy) in April 2021. She was referred to me as she was no longer able to stay in her major. At this time, she had earned 97 units and was enrolled in 12 more. With so many units already earned, she was unable to declare a new major without exceeding the 144-unit cap. We met and I was able to learn more about her and her passion and vision for her future career. She was already working on a gerontology minor, so we reached out to Dr. Miltiades to see if she would permit her to do a Special Major in gerontology. In addition to those courses, we added pre-requisite courses for her to enter a Master's in counseling or Master's in social work program. After a few back and forth meetings and finally gaining approval, she set out on her final two semesters. During her final year, her GPA went up and she finished on the Dean's list both terms. Since her graduation in spring 2022, she has been working and applying for graduate programs. I received word in July 2022 that she has been admitted into UMass Global University in Irvine, CA to earn her Master's in social work. Then, she can go on and work with the elderly and their families as they adjust through challenges and various transitions in life.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

The Student Health and Counseling Center (SHCC) hosted the "Taste of Counseling Event" virtually in February.

During the event, counselors introduced themselves, discussed their programs' focuses and what groups they currently run. One program discussed was Project Hope; other counselors spoke with students one-on-one about anxiety, depression and trauma to wellness checks.

Three-week, 50-minute group workshops available to students were discussed during the two-part virtual event.

Students who attended the event were able to sign up for upcoming workshops that stood out to them.

Students who were unable to attend the event can still learn more about SHCC resources and upcoming events on its website.

The mission of Medical Services is to promote the academic and personal success of Fresno State students by encouraging the maintenance of healthy lifestyles and providing affordable and accessible health and psychological care.

A student was awarded the Good Samaritan Grant and provided the following testimonial:

To the good folks at Good Samaritan Grant. It's been a long year for everyone, but personally, it's felt even worse for me. My mother, was diagnosed with cancer and quickly declined. I was able to see her in Atlanta, slightly coherent, during the winter break. Once I was back in Fresno she received a poor prognosis. Between spring semester and with a full course load and financial struggles, I was trying to find a way to see her before she died. With the Good Samaritan's help, I was able to visit my mother, and keep my focus on school. My mother died last month on the 18th. It's been a difficult time, but I wanted to be sure to say, thank you for your help. I will forever be grateful.

This was the second year of the 360 Wellness Challenge, which supported nearly 700 students during a 10-week healthy living challenge where students received weekly newsletters, tips, encouragement and fitness routines to try each week.

eCHECKUP to Go

A voluntary alcohol and cannabis educational module was available to all incoming and transfer students. The alcohol module had a 23% response rate and the cannabis module had an 18% response rate.



PEER AMBASSADORS OF WELLNESS

(PAW) volunteers collectively served 625 hours, produced 22 PAWdcast episodes and engaged in 17 events, reaching approximately 2,500 students.

1,889 students were reached through various health education presentations and trainings that include; sexual health education, stress management, alcohol and drug prevention, nutrition education, sexual assault, harassment and stalking, QPR suicide prevention training.

The Survivor Advocate provides confidential advocacy services, for students, staff, & faculty facing sexual assault, interpersonal violence, stalking, and sexual harassment. The Survivor Advocate served 116 unique students.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

In partnership with the library, an exhibit focused on the five senses was hosted for four weeks in various spaces of the library in honor of stress awareness month and finals season. Exhibits included a meditation based virtual reality experience in the Innovation Space, an optical illusion part of a unique design of the building called the Halo effect, listening stations in the Music and Media Room, scented vials from the Viticulture and Enology Department for aromatherapy, coloring stations on three floors and two DIY crafting stations. Each exhibit or station encouraged students to pause and take a mental health break to relieve stress and was designed to be stumbled upon as students moved about the library. Over 550 kits were distributed including 200 stress kits containing photo postcards, scratch and sniff stickers, calm strips and candy at a promotional tabling event outside the library.

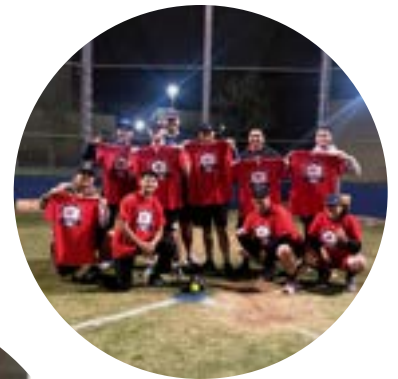

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Angela, a Mono/Chumash Native American woman, was raised in Fresno. Angela was in and out of the foster care system from age seven to twelve, which led to her being disconnected from her roots and feeling that she did not belong. Unfortunately, since a young age Angela had to learn to be independent. She was told by family members that she was not “smart enough” and would fall in the same path of drug and alcohol abuse. Despite the obstacles she has encountered, she persevered. She said, “I am proud to say I am broken chains; I am my ancestor’s creation, and I am grateful that God made me a strong Native woman and gave me the strength to be where I am at today.” Angela graduated this May, earning her Bachelor of Science in social work in just two years, during a global pandemic. She is currently interning at Madera County Department of Social Services and will be applying for the Master’s in Social Work program at Fresno State in 2023.

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The mission of Admissions & Recruitment is to support the university's enrollment goals by recruiting and admitting diverse students through equitable partnerships, innovative programs, high-quality services, and providing opportunities for lifelong success.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

The Admissions and Recruitment Customer Services was ranked number one for best customer service in the Education category in 2021. 12 metrics were used: customer service survey results, visitor volume, proactive actions, average chat accept time, average chat time, operator responsiveness, dropped chats, canned content, chat transfers, operator utilization, operator knowledge and chat volume. Fresno State was selected best in the education category and one of the 4 best chosen among 10,000 users. Our team continues to find creative ways to provide a high level of service, and connect and support our students and community.

Outreach and Special Programs (OSP) will dedicate its efforts on early outreach, special initiatives, underrepresented groups, and diversity. OSP will encourage and create a college going culture through exposure, promotion, and activities by partnering with school districts and community organizations.

MAJOR MILESTONES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The California State University hosted the inaugural Juneteenth Symposium via livestream, June 15 - 16, 2022. Featuring world-class speakers, evocative student performances, thought-provoking panel discussions and interactive breakout sessions, this student-led event will be an inspirational celebration of African American history and achievement as it sparks dialogue and innovation to bring about meaningful change to a more just and equitable world.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Inaugural Super Saturday Science Day was hosted on campus for middle and high school students, funded by the CSU Chancellor's Office Partnerships with Faith-Based Organizations. The event was hosted in collaboration with the College of Science and Math, with Dr. Calderon-Urrea presenting a keynote speech and various professors hosting workshops for the students. 125 students attended this event.

The mission of Central Valley Cal-SOAP is to educate, empower, and encourage students and their families to access all opportunities to higher education.

Summer Academy returned for the first time in two years.

Summer Academy was an intense 32.5 hour virtual program spread out over a week. There were three one-day college campus tour trips, where students were introduced to five campuses and the college experience. Students that were previously restricted from travel due to COVID were able to visit campuses they indicated most interest in during a survey.

Cal-SOAP reached its goal to help students through their financial aid process, with 70-94% completion rate for the target schools.



DEPARTMENT IMPACT

The story of one of our students, Diana M.:

As an upcoming senior, I began preparing for the summer of my junior year and I participated in Cal-SOAP's Senior Summer Academy. It was two weeks of information and learning that I desperately needed. By the end of the academy, I had filled up half a journal with notes. Then in the fall when I started coming in, I met Elia and Jessica (Cal-SOAP College Success Coaches), two hard-working individuals who I am very thankful for. From the beginning, I knew I could trust them and never hesitated to ask for help. While I would still feel lost at times, that feeling would quickly go away when I would stop by their office to ask a question. I could not have managed the college application process without them. I will forever be grateful for them and the Cal-SOAP program. I hope that Cal-SOAP continues to return to Tranquility High, many students have benefited from having them here as a support and they will continue to benefit.

Central California Educational Opportunity Center's mission is to provide information to residents of our valley to gain knowledge about post-secondary educational options and financial aid opportunities available to them. Furthermore, we provide academic advisement and assistance with the financial aid and college admission application process to those desiring to further their education. Our goal is to increase the number of under-represented populations enrolling into higher education, especially low income and/or first generation students. Additionally, we focus our outreach efforts to the aged-out foster youth, veterans and military-connected students, ex-offenders, teen parents, and disabled individuals.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Daniel Andrade, an EOC participant since April 2019, bought a 2-acre ranch with a home in Wonder Valley. It is the first home he has ever bought, and he said it was because of EOC that he was able to do that, especially since he has only been out of prison for three years.

We met him at a Parole and Community Team (PACT) meeting held by State Parole, where newly released individuals can learn about community resources available to help them move forward. Though Daniel needed employment, he also wanted to change his life for the better, so EOC helped him complete a FAFSA and admission for Fresno City College where he could learn HVAC. While waiting for classes to start, he took advantage of a free solar panel training, which gives students experience as they install panels to low-income residences. Daniel excelled and gained enough skills to secure employment with a local solar company. But he still went to college and obtained his HVAC certification.

Each year Daniel returns to EOC for guidance, to ensure he is on the right track to reach his goals and get help with the submission of a FAFSA. He is now seeking to become a state certified contractor and obtain an electrical coding certificate. Then, his goal is to enroll at Fresno State.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

Fresno State Educational Talent Search—Fresno was one of 35 TRIO programs from across the nation selected to participate in the Council for Opportunity in Education and Comcast NBC Universal, Jurassic World Rule Your Future STEAM Initiative and Symposium. Ten students from our six Central Valley high schools were chosen to participate in the launch event in early June 2022. Students attended a STEAM college and career fair, received a presentation on how STEAM makes movie magic, explored Universal Studios Hollywood Park, and got an exclusive panel discussion and Q&A with the Jurassic World Dominion director, writer, lead paleontologist, and some of the actors. Students were given an exclusive premiere of the Jurassic World Dominion movie before the world release date. As a special surprise, all students were gifted a new laptop. In Fall 2022, our students will participate in 'Genetics and DNA: STEAM in Conversation with Jurassic World,' one of the three courses currently being offered to the selected 35 TRIO programs.

The Financial Aid and Scholarships office had a soft rollout of CampusLogic Virtual Advisor, the 1st chatbot on campus! Virtual Advisor combines AI with student data to not only answer general questions but can also use PeopleSoft data to answer personalized conversations. The chatbot gives students access to financial aid information 24/7 with instant translation of more than 60 languages.

The Native American Initiative will partner with tribes and tribal organizations to provide Native American students access to higher education through advocacy, outreach, assistance and advising.

DEPARTMENT IMPACT

In collaboration with the Educational Talent Search-Porterville TRIO Program and the assistance of its director Juan Figueroa Jr., we were able to make successful visits to Porterville Unified schools and held district meetings with key stakeholders to build stronger partnerships for Native American students within the area. As a result, 76 students attended the Annual Native American Youth Conference (resulting in the largest number of students attending from the same district).

Outreach and Special Programs (OSP) will dedicate its efforts on early outreach, special initiatives, underrepresented groups, and diversity. OSP will encourage and create a college going culture through exposure, promotion, and activities by partnering with school districts and community organizations.
