

Dr. Khonepheth Liily Liemthongsamout



Dr. Khonepheth Lily Liemthongsamout earned her Doctor of Education degree in 2009 in International Multicultural Education from the University of San Francisco. She has over 10 years of teaching experience in elementary grades, middle school and adult education. Her administrative experience includes school instructional coordinator, summer school principal, Refugee Students Assistance Program manager and Reading First coordinator. Currently she is the coordinator for high school Linked Learning pathways for Sacramento City Unified School District. Dr. Liemthongsamout has also been an active community leader. In 2006, she founded the Annual Lao Educational Conference (ALEC) for Lao American students in grades 6-12 in the greater Sacramento area. She is the executive director of the Lao American Advancement Organization (LAAO), which is the non-profit organization that has been successfully sustaining the ALEC for the past eleven years. Her community service also includes teaching traditional dances and the Lao language to children of all ages during the summer months at the Wat Lao Saophuth, which is the first Buddhist temple in Sacramento that was established under the leadership of her father.

Lucky Siphongsay



Lucky Siphongsay is a first generation Lao refugee. He is currently a Program Manager for Fresno Interdenominational Refugee Ministry (FIRM). Prior to working in the non-profit sector, he was honorably discharged from the US Navy in 2008. His background is in social services/behavior health which helped pave the way for him to obtain a Masters of Arts degree in Counseling Psychology with an emphasis in Marriage and Family Therapy from National University, Fresno. While pursuing his degree, he worked in different sectors of mental health including inpatient and outpatient care, substance abuse, foster care, and conservatorship systems. In addition, he also currently serves as a board member for Abrazo Foster Family Agency. Furthermore, his passion lies in serving and advocating for his refugee community.

Phouangmala Diane Phakonekham



Diane Phakonekham is the youngest of five children. Because of the Vietnam War, her family escaped to Thailand in 1982. Living in a concentration camp for over a year, their journey continued to Santa Ana, CA in 1983. While her family has known true hardship and tragedy, Diane credits the experience into helping shape who she is today. Diane currently serves as the Executive Director of Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Central California (BBBSCC). She also is a proud member of the North Fresno Rotary. Diane has more than 20 years of management experience, having worked in management since 1995 at the age of 16. She graduated from Duncan Polytechnical High School in 1998, holds a Bachelor's of Science in Child Development, and a Masters of Science in Rehabilitation Counseling, both from California State University-Fresno. She also received a minor in psychology and criminology and certificates in: Victim Services, Drug and Alcohol Counseling, BBBS National Fundamental of Youth Protection, Youth Advocate, Rape Counselor, and Program Management.

Social Justice

This workshop will include a visit from a youth who has been involved in a social justice campaign in Fresno.

Leadership Building

In this workshop, students will learn how to engage in team-building activities as well as produce a fun presentation. Since Lao culture embraces courtesy and humbleness, Lao Americans may sometimes be viewed as being less bold than their American counterpart. Through this workshop, students will gain skills and knowledge of how to become a leader in their own right by stepping outside of their comfort zone. The workshop will consist of students working in groups of 5 to 6 people. Each group will be given a creative project which will encouraged them to speak up and step up!

Lao Cultural Heritage

Baci/Soukhoune is a unique and special ceremony in Laos that has been practiced by the the Lao people for hundreds of years. This ceremony is being held during numerous occasions including weddings, New Years, celebration of births, during illnesses or sickness and for opening of businesses among many other events. It involves the tying of white cotton strings around an individual's wrists and while tying the string, prayers are being said to wish someone well and to bless them with good health, happiness, love and prosperity. During this workshop, students will have the opportunity to participate in the Baci/Soukhoune ceremony and experienced firsthand this beautiful tradition.

Career Exploration

Sherina Han Souksavong



Sherina Han Souksavong graduated from Fresno State in 2015 with a B.S. in Biology and have returned this past spring to pursue her passion the field of nursing. She shares that she has been very fortunate to be a part of the Lao community for the majority of her life, which she believes shaped her into the more confident and compassionate person she is today. As a child, she went to Stone Soup with her parents and sisters to learn how to Lao dance. She knew at a young age that dancing wasn't for her and decided to learn the ranat, a Lao male-dominated instrument, instead. Little did she know that one day she would have the honor in teaching songs of Lao folktale to Lao-American youths on the ranat. Many have questioned why she chooses to dedicate her time to volunteering in the community while working and being a full-time student. For her, it's possible to excel in academics, while still having the time to work and have fun, actively serving our Lao community and hanging out with friends on the weekends; unfortunately, not many see that too. She has so much joy seeing her students become excited after learning a new song. Not only does it keep our parents' and relative's heritage alive, but it gives Lao-Americans pride in their roots in an era where academics is the only thing so heavily pushed. She hopes that she can positively influence other Lao-Americans to have pride in their heritage, as well as, do what they love and make the smart decisions about their life choices and education that will help them achieve it.

David Sibou Bouttavong



David Sibou Bouttavong is a first-generation queer Laotian. Soon after his parents and older sister left Laos and landed in Seattle, David was born. As a child, Bouttavong's family relocated to California's Central Valley and his father began to work in the fields picking grapes while his mother worked at an agriculture-packaging center. Bouttavong grew up in Fresno, California where gun violence and drugs abuse were normal; however, he was able to persevere through the adverse.

Bouttavong studied at Fresno State, where he majored in health science with a focus in community education. It was during his years at Fresno State that Bouttavong got involved in community change. He started to work with Planned Parenthood's education department, providing programs in schools, community settings and juvenile detention centers for young men. During this pivotal time, he was introduced to healing and trauma informed practices, which he continues to use today.

As a young queer person of color, David grappled with many questions regarding his identity. The intersectionality of Bouttavong's identities created internal conflict when having to decide how "out" he could or should be. As a community leader, however, Bouttavong knew that he had a responsibility to be his full true self. "It is important for me to be out and proud, so that youth who look like me, who can identify with me, know that there is someone out there in the community making a difference and they can do it too." Today, David works as a Program Manager with the Fresno Barrios Unidos in partnership with Fresno Unified School District providing Comprehensive Sex Education in local high schools.

Joh Nouanesymanivanh



Joh was born in Muang Phonthong District of Champassack Providence. Growing up during the Vietnam War Era, Joh understood the meaning of struggles and hardships at a very young age. Around the early age of 5, Joh recalled the horror and traumatic effects of living next to a police station that was later converted to a concentration camp by the communist regime. As a child, Joh shared that when he peeked through the balcony from his house, he could see dead people being hung from poles inside the concentration camp. Joh shared that his mother is his hero. She continues to have profound impact on his life. She played a vital role in helping him cope with his traumatic childhood. Joh recalled as a child, waking up from countless nightmares. His mother was always there to rock him back to sleep and reminded him that even though life is difficult and harsh, bad times do not last forever, and that one should never give up hope.

Joh graduated from Edison High School in 1991 and went on to pursue and obtained his R.S. in Social Work in 1992 and M.S. in Counseling in 2004 at

Prior to his current position as an adjunct counselor/instructor at Fresno City College, Joh has previously worked in the law enforcement and foster care social work field. He has a combined experience of 14 years plus with Fresno County Probation (work program/juvenile hall), California Department of Correction and Rehabilitation, and foster care social worker.

Joh noted that he was initially an electrical engineer major. He took a summer job with Stone Soup in 1994, found his calling, switched to social work major, and has never looked back. Joh enjoys working with the communities, building leadership, connecting and reaching out to at-risk youths.

Khonesavanh Saysamongdy



Khonesavanh Saysamongdy is a 22-year-old Fresno State student who will turn 23 in May, as well as graduating in the same month. He currently attends California State University, Fresno where he will receive his B.A. degree in Media Communications and Journalism, specifically, Multimedia. He is also the Visuals Editor of the Fresno State school newspaper, the Collegian. His passion revolves around sharing stories visually whether it is through photography or video. The overall goal is to leave a legacy behind where his work will be well known throughout the world. His advice for students is to have a dream and to never be fearful of taking risks and opportunities.

Annie Bounthavalang Lansing was born in Laos, raised and educated in Fresno, California. She is an alumna of California State University, Fresno, graduated in 2001 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business, with a focus in International Business. In 2004, she enlisted in the United States Army as a Military Intelligence, Counter Intelligence Agent and was sent to Afghanistan. She was the unit's Intelligence Officer (S-2) and was in charge of eight other Military Intelligence professionals whose mission was to provide threat analysis of the enemy, which included current threat assessments against our Forward Operating Base (FOB), conditions of the roads for outgoing conveys (to avoid improvised Explosion Devices), insider threats, and screenings of Afghans and non U.S. personnel who worked on the FOB. Through the many years of experience in the military, she learned that hard work, perseverance, focus and being disciplined will get you to your goals. From the military, she also gained many invaluable skills that have helped her achieved her many dreams. In addition, Annie also has a passion for business and in 2011, she bought an existing Edible Arrangements Franchise located on Herndon and Milburn in Fresno, CA. It has been an honor and a blessing to have served our country and her community once again.
